

# Implementation of previous Interim Inspector-General of Biosecurity recommendations - review April 2016

Audit report No. 2015-16/04

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#### Introduction

1. The Interim Inspector-General of Biosecurity (IIGB) 2015-16 work program includes a review to assess the actions taken by the Department of Agriculture and Water Resources (the department) to address recommendations included in previous IIGB audits and reviews.

### **Background**

2. In July 2009, the Australian Government appointed an IIGB to enhance the integrity of Australia's biosecurity systems through the independent evaluation and verification of the performance of these programs across the biosecurity continuum – pre-border, border and post-border.

## **Review objective**

3. The objective of this review was to assess the actions taken by the department to implement recommendations generated by IIGB audits and reviews since the IIGB's review, Implementation of previous Interim Inspector-General of Biosecurity recommendations, published on 24 August 2015.

## Scope

- 4. The scope of the review was to assess the adequacy of actions taken and recorded in the department's database (eTRAC), where the department has marked implementation of a recommendation as 'complete'.
- 5. All recommendations included in completed IIGB reports are recorded in eTRAC, which is used to track and update progress on the department's high-level actions and decisions.
- 6. As at 1 February 2016, eTRAC contained 26 recommendations marked as 'complete', from 8 published reports.
- 7. This review also included two recommendations from previous reviews relating to Werribee Post-arrival Quarantine Facility and Eastern Creek Animal Quarantine Station.
- 8. A total of 28 recommendations were reviewed.

### **Methodology**

- 9. The IIGB considered the department's actions, as reported in eTRAC, to implement each of the 28 recommendations under review.
- 10. Where the IIGB considered the original intent and purpose of the recommendation had been satisfactorily addressed, the IIGB has closed the recommendation for no further action or follow-up.
- 11. In some cases, the IIGB considered further information was required or the actions taken did not fully address the intent of the recommendation. In these cases, the IIGB approached the department for further information or clarification, regarding the actions taken to implement the recommendation.
- 12. Where full implementation of a recommendation required wider departmental action, for example significant modification or enhancement of an IT system, or the IIGB considered that the nature of the biosecurity risk warrants ongoing monitoring, it is intended that these recommendations will be reviewed again in six months' time.

### **Findings**

- 13. The IIGB considers implementation of 20 of the 28 recommendations as satisfactory and regards these recommendations as 'completed' (Attachment A).
- 14. In some cases, the IIGB approached the department for updated information on the actions taken to address recommendations. In all these cases, the IIGB is satisfied with the responses received from the department.
- 15. The IIGB considers that 8 of the 28 recommendations should remain 'live' and be reviewed again in six months' time (Attachment B).
- 16. All recommendations on the review list are judged to be low risk, and full implementation of some of these is dependent upon parties external to the department (and outside the department's control).

#### Conclusion

17. The IIGB considers that the solid and ongoing rate of implement of IIGB recommendations demonstrates the department's continued its commitment to continual improvement in biosecurity risk management.

# Next review cycle

18. The IIGB notes that the timing and scope of future reviews of the department's implementation of IIGB recommendations will be considered as part of the development of the Inspector-General of Biosecurity's 2016-17 work program.
